










Rethinking our charism to discover the integral ecology dimensions of our Founders, and the gift our charism contributes to living out the LSAP

There are concrete actions that we can take as a Congregation: with our simple lifestyle, small daily actions such as avoiding the use of plastic and paper, turning off unnecessary lights, reducing water consumption, planting trees, etc.... Beginning with a small step, we will be able to walk a long way together.

Our founders, without using the word ecology, had a clear awareness of what ecology is, and of the need to combat everything that separates us from God. Father Chaminade and Mother Adele had a very strong sense of what conversion is, of the purpose of the community walking together toward holiness, of the power of critical mass. I think they would have no difficulty in joining the Laudato Si' Action Platform. It is the opportunity to live our mission globally, to live our spirituality more deeply.

We highly value the vision of the native peoples who see the Earth as a mother, the Pachamama, who nourishes and sustains. A mother is cared for and respected. Laudato si' reflects 5 numbers (470 to 475) of the document of Aparecida (2007): nature is a free inheritance, a precious space for human coexistence but threatened by economic and technological powers. We are part of an irrational exploitation. It is worthwhile to go back to these numbers and see the practical proposals which are made to consider them from each part of the world.

I find a much meaning in the words of Leonardo Boff: "As important as environmental and social ecology, is mental ecology.... If the Earth is in a bad state and is sick, it is a sign that the mind is sick".

As women, we are called to care for life in its totality. There is a strong call to religious life and it is urgent to respond. Starting from the personal level, let us move on to a community, congregational, Marianist Family, ecclesial, social, and social commitment.

It seems to me that the first conversion is, first of all, **to become aware of my way of looking at the world**, to find again the surprise, the wonder, not to consider that nature is only the frame of our life, to realize that it is not separated from us. The experience we have lived during this year with the isolation has made us see the power of nature.

The second conversion is **to learn to listen to the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor**. We have the duty to stay well informed and not to pass superficially over the information we receive.

We are not independent units. In my community and in my unit, in communion with the Marianist Family and with the local Church, it is possible to create synergy.

What do we need to change in order to become green communities?

I feel fascinated and challenged by the idea of the ecosystem in which everything is connected. Any part that is destroyed can be harmful to the whole, and Covid has demonstrated this. The Church and the world are asking us to save the planet. Many organizations large and small, international, religious and secular, have already set out to respond urgently to this environmental crisis. Reading Laudato Si' has increased my desire to know. I want to understand the beauty of the world God has given us. We need a real conversion that does not remain in theory. Small projects such as arousing the interest of the people I meet every day, highlighting the problems that impoverish people and the earth, asking for their awareness and the joy of serving others, cultivating hope, witnessing and much prayer in the certainty that something will change for the better. Recycling, composting, managing the use of electricity, admiring creation for all that it gives us, allowing ourselves to be caught by its beauty...

We can start from below and, case by case, act at the most concrete and local levels, and then expand to the farthest reaches of our countries and our world... Let us seek out others and embrace the world as it is, without fear of pain or a sense of inadequacy. (FT #78)
